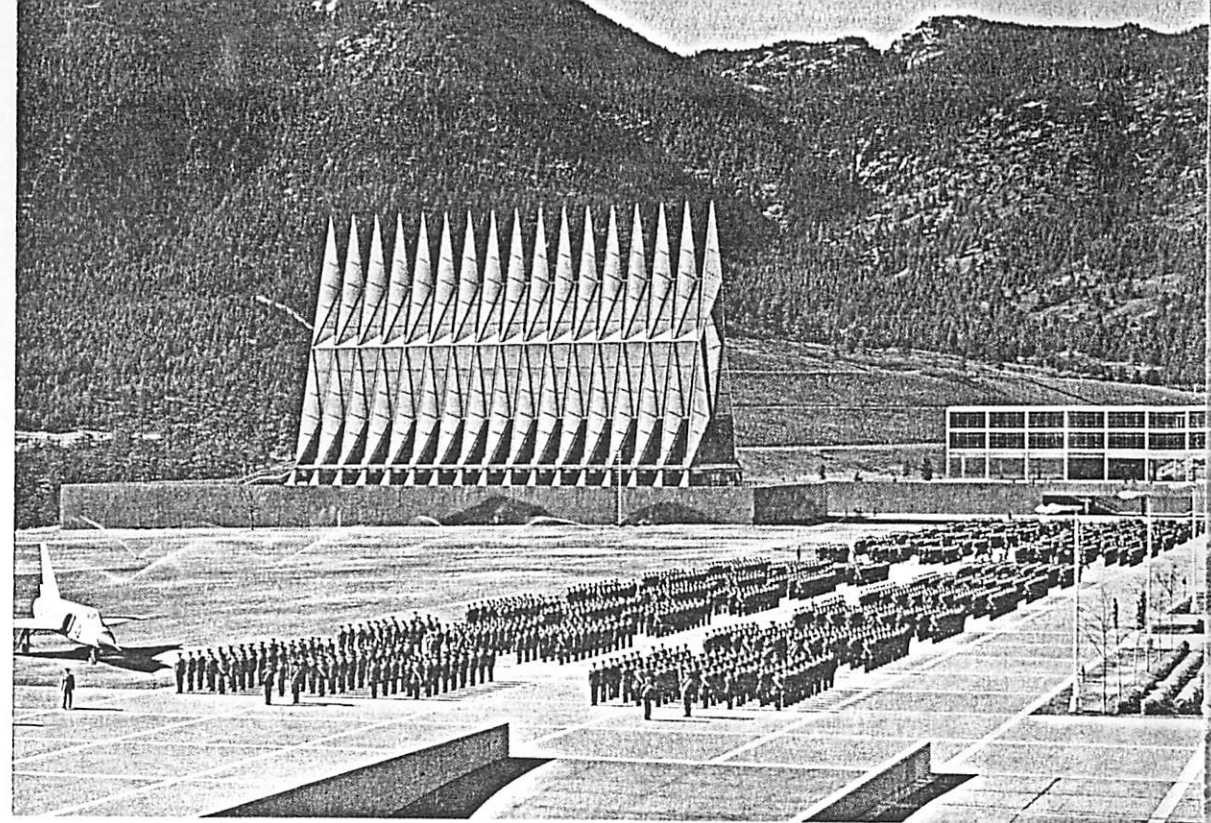


Fred A. Brockway was born in Jamestown, Pennsylvania on 2 April, 1917. He was the fourth child of Mr. and Mrs. Fred H. Brockway. In 1937 he graduated from Breckenridge Senior High School in San Antonio, Texas. He enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1942 and through the Aviation Cadet program earned a commission in 1943. During this period of military service he served in the European Theatre of Operations and earned the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with three oak leaf clusters. In 1945 he was released from active duty and resumed work on his Bachelor and Masters Degrees at the University of Texas, Austin, Texas, receiving them in 1946 and 1947. He returned to active duty in 1951 and in 1954 began instructor duty with the Air Force Academy. In 1961 he completed work on his PhD and received it from the University of Colorado, Boulder, Colorado. In 1964 he received the Air Force Commendation Medal. He expired 11 March, 1965. He is survived by his wife, Paula; three sons, William Lee, Charles, and Fred Jr; his mother, a resident of San Antonio, Texas; two sisters, and a brother.



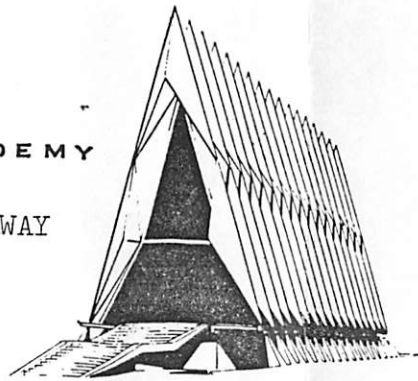
