Venton H. Scott 1921 - 1994

Rev. Venton H. Scott passed away at his home in Hartland Wisconsin on Monday, December 19, 1994 at the age of 73 years. He was born in Huntington, West Virginia.

Venton was a retired pastor of the Wisconsin Conference of the United Methodist Church. He served the Wisconsin churches of Burlington, Chetek, Richland Center, Glenwood City, Downing, Emerald, and most recently at the Gethsemene United Methodist Church in Pewaukee. He had dual professions, 23 years as a college professor and 21 years as a clergyman.

He was a B-17 Radio Operator in the 306th Bomb Group, 8th Air Force. During a mission destined for Stuttgart, Germany, his plane was forced to land in Switzerland. He, and many of his crew, were held in an internee camp until their release. Upon his return from the military, he received his undergraduate degree from Case Western Reserve, and his graduate degree.

He is survived by his children, David V. Scott of Margate Fla., William S. Scott of Oshkosh, Wis., James A. Scott of Minneapolis, Minn., Margaret Lynn Scott of Nashville, Tenn., and John H. Scott of Philadelphia, Pa.. He is further survived by his brother, Eugene Scott of Port Washington, NY.; three grandchildren, Erin, Haley, and Isaac; daughters-in-law, Laura and Cheryl; a sister-in-law, Elizabeth Scott of New Fairfield, Conn., other relatives and a host of friends. He was preceded in death by his wife, Margaret in 1982, and his twin brother, Quentin D. Scott.
