Dear Russell,

Though it seems awkward, I hope I'm on a first name basis by now. You certainly are where my name is concerned.

Business first. I do want Lt. Streun's mission reports, although I doubt if he flew more than three. Please send all you have.

Also, please send another copy of First Over Germany. I want to give it to an Oklahoma library -- perhaps at the college where he graduated.

Am still working on my book. In fact, I started all over. I never want to fail to give credit where credit is due, and Davis (my teacher at OU) did offer some good suggestions which I am working on. But he also did a pretty good job of demoralizing me. It has taken me a while to sort through his comments.

First of all, I think his belief that historical facts flatten a story is screwy. They certainly do not for me or Rosamund Pilcher. She uses so many of the same ideas I plotted in my book in her latest (best seller) Coming Home.

I may not quote as much of your book as in the original draft, but I shan't leave out much. With your permission of course.

Next, I have some questions.

What does the term "Abbeville Kids" mean? I'm sure it has some special significance I missed in reading the book.

Please tell me about Hunter Publishing. Is it still in business?

What is its publishing criteria?

Can it be engaged to publish a book and if so, would the cost be prohibitive? Probably so, I would guess.

What were the 1944-45 ribbons for 306th combat service excluding decorations, and are they available now, perhaps at the Air Force Museum, Wright-Pat?

Dear Lucille:

I regret that I haven't gotten backnto your story earlier, but I seem to be involved too much in Family History, but I have a deadline there. We are celebrating our 50th wedding anniversary 13 July, and our children decided it should be done in Kalamazoo, MI, our hometown, and will probably include tons of relatives from both sides of hae family, although not many actually live there now.

The Abbeville Kids were the FW 190s of the Luftwaffe stationed in Northern France, who chased the B-17s frequently early in the war.

Hunter Publishing is a large printing company. You ought to consider someone more in your region. Call one of the universities in your area, ask for the publications director, and talk to him/her about prospects and guidance. They will have a good handle on the printers who might be able to help you. I went to Hunter because I knew them and had worked with them closely over some years. But, they are expensive.

In 44-45, men were receiving Air Medals, Purple Hearts for wounds, Distinguished Flying Crosses. The ETO ribbon was for service in that theatre. Yes, ribbons are available. I would suggest you contact a service organization: National Guard, Air Reserve unit, American Legion, etc.

I see people wearing patches for 8th, etc.

Dear Lucille:

I enjoyed your letter, received yesterday, and hasten to answer it before family descends for several days of Thanksgiving celebrations and football.

As to your manuscript, perhaps what you need are some Combat Mission reports on your husband. We sell them for 3 missions for \$5, and if you would let me pick out perhaps six of his that were interestingyou would be going back to the real "raw" material for your writing, and the teacher could exult at that, rather than just quoting out of my book. Let me know.

I don't know where that crew picture came from. I didn't mark its origin on the back, but it very likely came from one of the crew members.

I amiled the book to Standlee. And I still have copies available.

Varient spellings of 306th names are legion, and it has been difficult for me at times to straighten them out. So, If I hit a bad source first, it usually has taken some time to get the wright name in place later. Even the original orders often had the names misspelled. I'm always happy to finally get it right. The book manuscript was in preparation 15 years ago and I have learned a lot since.

Was very pleased about that as I had lost contact with all of his crew. I wrote to him, and later we visited by telephone. Again, thanks!

Then in the recent issue of "Echoes" I noticed the name of Hazel Stewart Kane, wife of Robert D. Stewart, pilot of Ted's ship. She was listed as "306th Family." I have also been in contact with Stewart's family this year.
