
Dear Russ:

Dear Russ: it was a pleasure meeting you and your wife at the reunion.


I'm behind in my correspondence, and wanted to send this check on sooner for your research efforts.

The ad for the videos just came out. I hadn't seen such previously.


I missed a program that NBC televised a couple years ago about the air war in Europe. I believe it was called "All the Fine Young Men" Perhaps these videos contain some of the same material.
