SUGGESTION: "Either a new deal on the waiter staff (new waiters) or another election for a mess officer.....How's for a new and polite bartender?"

ANSWER: How about being specific about your gripes? If you have something to suggest that will eliminate a difficulty why not do so instead of criticizing men who are working hard at one of the Army's toughest jobs? SB probably can arrange for you to be assigned assistant mess officer if you think that will help any.

SUGGESTION: "Before the end of the war, various brass, from Eisenhower on down filled the air with glowing promises of educational opportunity after VE day.....As far as military subjects are concerned the majority of us have learned nothing new from those time killing lectures.....we aren't interested in military subjects, other than those necessary for correctly performing our duties, and we don't give a damn if a slit trench is 2 feet or 10 feet deep or if shelter tents are pitched in 5 or 100 cents. As for the Army talks a few of us do more than look at the pictures in the newspapers and magazines and we consider ourselves fairly conversant with current events and have opinions of

our own. No amount of throat jarring or propagandizing will change our views and we resent the time wasted in these sessions. How about organizing a school with a broader range of subjects, qualified instructors and voluntary attendance and choice of subject?

Since the cessation of hostilities the brass feels that no one has any work to do. Work has increased rather than decreased for some personnel such as clerks, guards, cooks, mechanics, etc., and they now have the added burden of attending the above-mentioned nonsensical lectures....."

ANSWER: 1. You are right about glowing promises. Complete preparation was made for the type of educational opportunity most now wanted, but it is not in effect here on a broad scale because we have a more important operational job to finish. However, you are invited to visit the I & S Office and learn what is available. For example, did you know there are three types of schooling by mail? Have you made any effort at all to find out about these things? They're on several bulletin boards, you know.

2. As for military subjects you may not like to pitch a shelter tent but you may very likely have to do so in the near future. Can you honestly criticize a policy of preparing for an eventuality?

3. As for the Army Talks, you are being given the truth. In discussing a subject with others what is your authority for your statements? If you can quote people well known for their competent decisions all well and good; but if it is merely hearsay, it is worthless. How about giving some constructive criticism on how to improve Army Talks?

4. The "brass" definitely does not feel that there is no longer any work to do. You are grossly misinformed if you think individuals must attend scheduled lectures in spite of important other duties.
