ANSWER: To the best of our knowledge food has not dropped off in quality, though we admit there are times when certain items are not as plentiful as we would like. Sugar is one of these items. However in the future the Mess Management will see that Sugar is rationed when necessary to insure equal distribution to all personnel.

There is no shortage of Salt. The only reason for its absence from the Mess Tables is the lack of containers (Salt Shakers) which, though plentiful a short time ago, have 'walked away' until very few are left. However an effort is being made at the present time to secure additional shakers which we hope will be in the Mess by the time this is published. When salt was served in open containers the customers griped about it getting dirty from fingers dipping into it.

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
