Mission: Merseburg

TO : Commanding Officer, 306th Bombardment Group (H).

1. Narrative

1 - 6 A/C of 306th Group took off at 0859 hours, flying High Squadron in High Group in 40th CBW. 18 A/C plus 2 spares took off at 0912 hours, flying High Group in 41st "B" CBW. 41st "B" CBW ran increasingly behind schedule going out, reaching target 28 minutes late, largely due to "S"ing on course between Brussels area and 7 degrees East. Approaching target, 306th High Group flew as described in section 4 and, after bombs away made a sharp left turn to avoid Halle flak, rejoining lead group (which had continued through flak) at 51°26'N-10°47'E. Course then parallel and to north of briefed route until Marburg flak came up, when Wing leader turned sharp south and came home on briefed route. Rendezvous and assembly satisfactory. English coast 1056 hours, Belgian coast 1123 hours, both on course. Target 1400 hours, Belgian coast 1605 hours (24 minutes late), English coast 1626 hours, Base 1649½ hours.

6 A/C of 306th flying High Squadron, flew same course as High Composite Group Leader throughout. It is of note that this High Group turned right after bombs away and circled Halle flak area.

2. Fighter Opposition and Fighter Support

2 - No enemy A/C encountered. Escort was good without gaps. P-47's met at coast going in at 1125 hours. P-51's at 50°04'N-06°00'E. Stayed with formation until P-38's took over at 1415 hours on the way out.

3. A.A. Gun Fire

Meager inaccurate fire at target with solid barrage from Halle in front which Group Leader avoided by sharp bank to left after bombs away. Little other flak on entire route.

4. Bombing

Crews report "excellent" bombing results with flames and smoke rising almost to altitude of bombers. Estimates agree on from 18 to 20,000 feet. Main 306th Group with 41st "B" could not make run as briefed because Low Group swung under them on approach. Briefed M.P.I. visible and unhit. When Low Group interfered, had to make run on heading of 30 degrees and drifting smoke obscured M.P.I. Lead bombardier synchronized on corner brown coal mine and moved indicies to M.P.I. Navigator, ball turret gunner and other crews report direct hit. Crews with 40th CBW which made run at 45 degrees state bombs over. Pictures show tremendous fire and smoke covering entire target area.

5. Leaflets



## 100 PLANES FIGHT VER 5 OIL PLANTS

### Nazis Put Up 1,000, But Heavies Hit Targets

THE fiercest and toughest battle of the air war raged from the border of Western Germany to Czechoslovakia yesterday when British-based American heavies made a dramatic switch from the West Wall to blitz five Nazi oil plants.

THREE THOUSAND planes fought it out. So highly do the Nazis value these oil factories that they sent up ONE THOUSAND fighters to defend them from the onslaught of TWO THOUSAND Allied planes—1,000 Forts and Liberators and a similar number of long-range fighters.

At midnight last night an American communiqué reported that 150 enemy planes were shot down for the loss of 52 aircraft—12 bombers and 10 fighters.

Four separate striking forces of heavy bombers reported being set up by up to 250 enemy planes.

The targets were the Leuna Refinery at Merseburg, the Lutzendorf factory, 14 miles south of Halle, the Bohlen plant just outside Leipzig, the refinery at Zeitz and the factory Brux, on the borders of Czechoslovakia.

In addition, the fighter aircraft supply plant at Zwickau, south of Leipzig, and the railroad yards at Zwickau were also attacked.

The German pilots used every trick, every manœuvre to reach the bombers.

They came from out of the sun, at a time. They came in singly and in pairs from the sides. They came in a steady stream from below. They flew into a hail of lead from the bombers and the pursuing American fighters.

#### Flak, Rockets, Debris

From the ground the Nazis heavily defended the well-camouflaged oil plants, and threw up a cloud-like barrage of flak.

From one target the Nazis fired ground rockets which exploded in bursts of flame near the bomber formations.

A third danger for our airmen was from flying burning parts of exploding and crashing aircraft and enemy parachutes.

Returning pilots told many vivid stories of their combats. One pilot gave this most dramatic account of all:

"The Germans kept on coming at us, but when he was even with our tail he blew up. That was no novelty.

"Planes were blowing up all over the sky. You could have walked down to earth stepping from chute to chute among all those enemy baling out."

#### Suicide Attacks

Another pilot said, "German fighters tried to lure our escort out of position with feints by suicide forces.

"About 200 assorted Messerschmitt and Focke-Wulfs gave us hell. We just had to hold the trigger down and let them run into it."

Probably the most heavily defended target was the Leuna plant.

In 1938 it already covered four square miles. Production was then 370,000 tons of synthetic petrol.

Output since the war began must have been greatly increased. Its destruction would be as great a loss to the Nazis as that of Ploesti.

## 4 Oil Plants Hit Deep in The Reich

### 1 in Czechoslovakia Also Pounded; Cost Is 42 Bombers, 10 Fighters

One of the strongest forces of American heavy bombers and fighters ever sent against German targets thundered across Europe yesterday to attack four major synthetic-oil plants in the Leipzig area of Germany and one at Brux, inside Czechoslovakia. In addition, the aircraft repair plant at Zwickau, south of Leipzig, was hit.

Nearly 1,000 Fortresses and Liberators, escorted by as many Mustangs, Thunderbolts and Lightnings, were engaged in the operation.

Battling through savage resistance from enemy fighters, the planes bombed their targets with excellent results, photographs taken during the operations indicated. Forty-two American bombers and ten fighters failed to return.

While some formations encountered fierce opposition, others saw not a single enemy plane. The force which went to Brux said as many as 200 interceptors of all kinds swept in, sometimes 40 or 50 at a time. American fighter pilots claimed 66 enemy aircraft shot down; bomber crews' claims had not been tabulated at a late hour.

One fighter pilot, 1/Lt. Robert J. Rankin, of Washington, reported shooting down five—the second pilot in the ETO to make such a score.

#### Channel Blitz Continues

As the heavies switched suddenly to a new kind of objective in the campaign to paralyze the German war machine before the western invasion, American and British medium, light and fighter-bombers kept up the pounding of airfields and rail targets in France and Belgium with a follow-up to the RAF's night blows against rail yards at Boulogne and Louvain and other targets in the same countries.

Targets in the Leipzig area were the big Leuna oil plant at Merseburg, 18 miles west of Leipzig; other plants at Lutzendorf, 14 miles south of Halle; Bohlen, just outside of Leipzig, and Zeitz. The Lutzendorf plant alone produces an estimated 3,000 tons of synthetic oil yearly, mostly of the Diesel variety.

Leipzig is an estimated 550 airline miles from London and Brux 650.

The occupied countries, meanwhile, shook under thousands of tons of high explosives as smaller planes of the Ninth Air Force, the RAF and Allied units carried on the cross-Channel pre-invasion blitz.

The Ninth—which Thursday had carried out three major operations in one day for the first time—sent Marauders and A20s against five important Luftwaffe fields in northern France. No enemy aircraft were sighted, and all of the bombers and escorting fighters returned.

Simultaneously, bombers and fighter-bombers of the Second Tactical Air Force (RAF, Dominion and Allied) attacked railway and other military targets in northern France.

USSTAF headquarters announced yesterday that its two bombing operations on Thursday—against 11 German railway yards in Belgium, France, Luxembourg and western Germany—had cost 16 bombers and ten fighters. American bomber crews claimed three enemy aircraft shot down; fighter pilots claimed 15.
