Bomber Command Narrative of Operations
Day Operation - 4 April 1943
Mission No. 49
TARGET - Renault Works at Billancourt

Excellent results were obtained by 85 B-17s which dropped 502 x 1000 GP bombs on the important Renault motor vehicle and armament factories 2 miles SE of Paris. Bombing runs were made without interference under excellent weather conditions, and strike and PRU photographs show severe damage. E/A opposition was strong after bombing, and 4 bombers were shot down. Effective withdrawal fighter support was picked up at Rouen. Flak was slight. 25 B-24s successfully carried out 3 diversionary sweeps over the North Sea.

BOMBING RESULTS: Reconnaissance photographs show that severe damage was caused to a large number of the buildings of the Renault Factories, and Salmson Works. Bombs totalling 502 x 1000 GP were dropped from 22,000 to 26,300 ft. at 1414-1417 hrs. The bursts were well concentrated.

REASONS FOR FAILURE TO BOMB: 12 aircraft failed to bomb, 11 because of mechanical failures and 1 because of sickness of the pilot.

ENCOUNTERS: E/A opposition was first encountered after bombing and continued from a point just W of the target to the French Coast. Up to 75 e/a were reported seen, all FW-190s and Me-109s, except 1 Me-110 and 1 Ju-88. Aggressive and vigorous attacks were made, mostly in groups of 4 - 6 and coming largely from the tail, from above and below. Two Groups reported FW-190s using dive-bombing technique to drop bombs on the formation. Many e/a had red, white and yellow noses, with some having red fins and several black and white diagonal stripes on the belly. Me-109s with yellow bellies and FW-190s with grey and black bodies were also reported. 1 Me-109 was seen with a broad red band around the fuselage behind the cockpit.

PERSONNEL CASUALTIES: Two crew members were seriously wounded, 4 slightly wounded, and 39 are missing. At least 16 chutes were seen from the four planes lost over France.

EQUIPMENT CASUALTIES:

Lost: Of 2 B-17s reported down 10 miles SE of Rouen, 1 was seen in flames with the tail shot off, and the other was observed to hit the ground and explode. Two other B-17s were lost N of Rouen, 1 exploding in the air and the other crashing with 3 engines on fire.

Estimated Battle Damage: Category A - 15 B-17s; Category AC - 1 B-17.

FLAK: Over the target slight to moderate inaccurate flak was encountered, with black and yellow or white bursts. Slight inaccurate flak was also reported over St.Cyr, Rouen, and 10-12 miles S. of St.Valery. Several unusually large black bursts were reported W. of Paris on the way to Rouen. One crew reported encountering a different kind of flak, consisting of red bursts which formed numerous smaller explosions in the area surrounding the original burst.

FIGHTER SUPPORT: 20 Squadrons of Spitfires provided escort and cover across the Channel and excellent withdrawal support from Rouen to Beachy Head.

ROUTE: Out - Base to Harwich to 51°20'N-02°00'E, to 51°20'N-02°20'E, to 51°30'N-02°30'E, to Beachy Head via Ashford, to 8 miles E. of Dieppe, to I.P. at Pontoise, to target.

Back - Target to Rouen, to St.Valery, to Selscy Bill, to bases.

WEATHER: At take-off there was 6/10 - 8/10 low cloud with 1 - 2 miles visibility. Over the North Sea 6/10 to 8/10 strato-cumulus was encountered with 2/10 over N. side of Channel. There was no cloud over the target which was visible from the French coast. On the return route 4/10 to 6/10 cumulus was reported over England, with 5-10 miles visibility at bases.

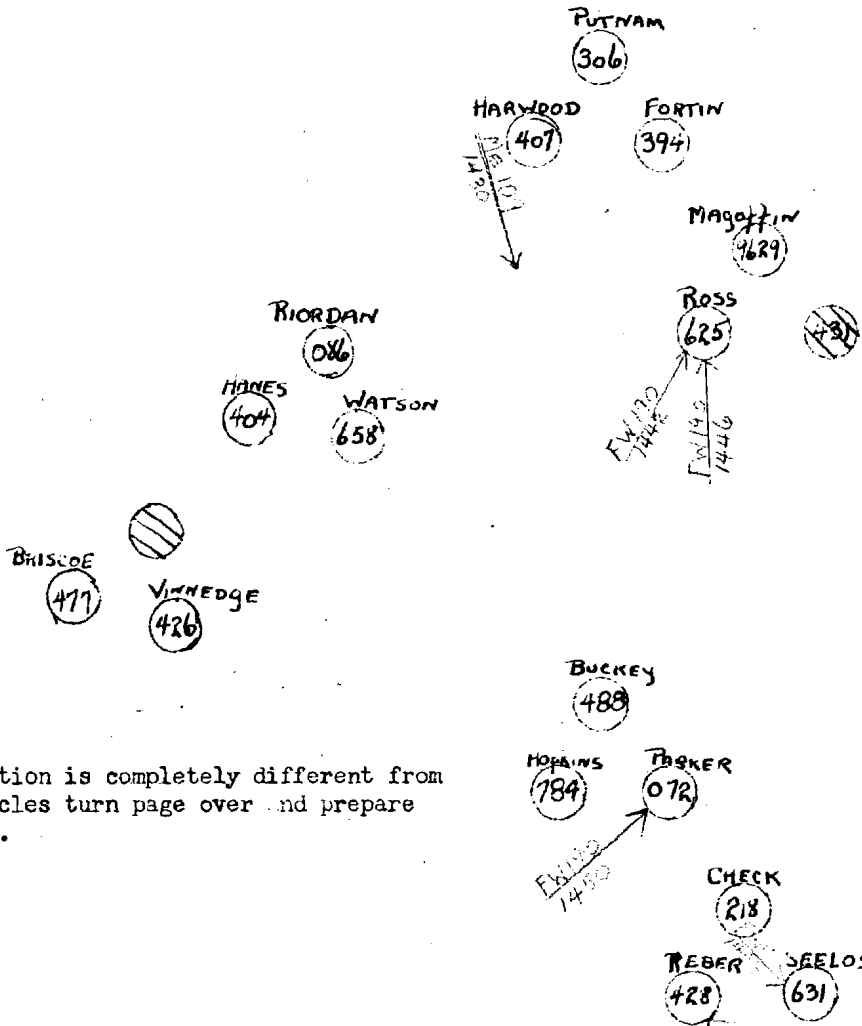
OBSERVATIONS: Marshalling yards at Gournay showed much activity. Five large ships were observed in the harbor at Dieppe. 15 e/a were observed taking off from A/D SW of Pontoise and 33 from another at Villacoublay. An A/D was reported under construction about 5 miles S of Hagny. A suspected oil refinery with 6 large tanks was seen near St.Germain.

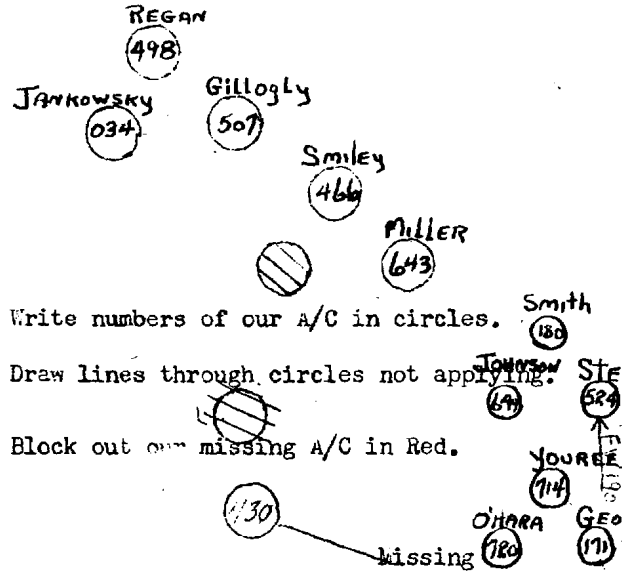
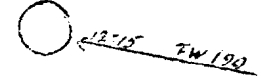
25 B-24s carried out 3 uneventful diversionary sweeps over the North Sea from Harwich toward the French and Belgian coasts. Fighter escort was provided on all but the last of the sweeps. One aircraft returned early due to mechanical failure. Considerable enemy reaction to these sweeps was reported by RDF.

(A) 1. 30 AIRCRAFT OF THE 367, 368, 369, AND 423RD SQUADRONS TOOK OFF AT 1055 TO BOMB THE RENAULT WORKS AT PARIS, FRANCE. 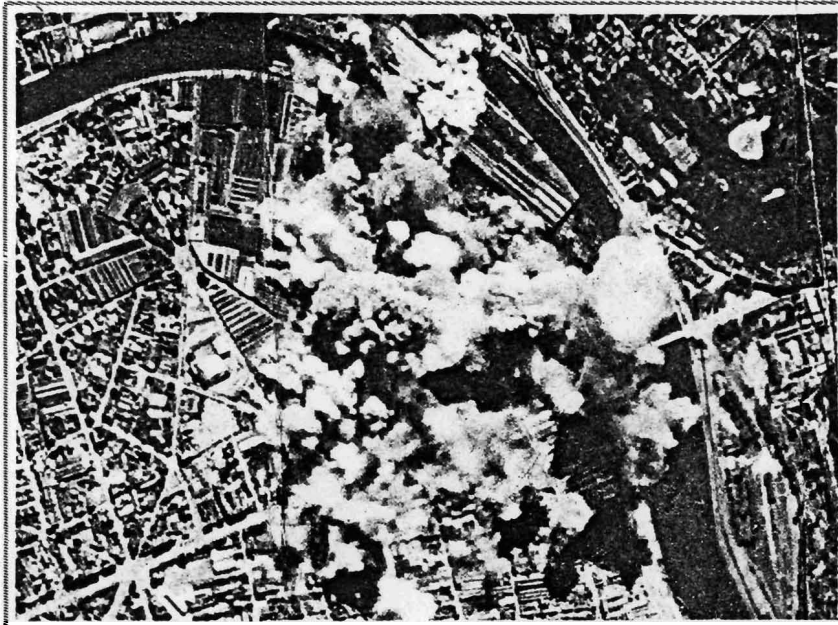

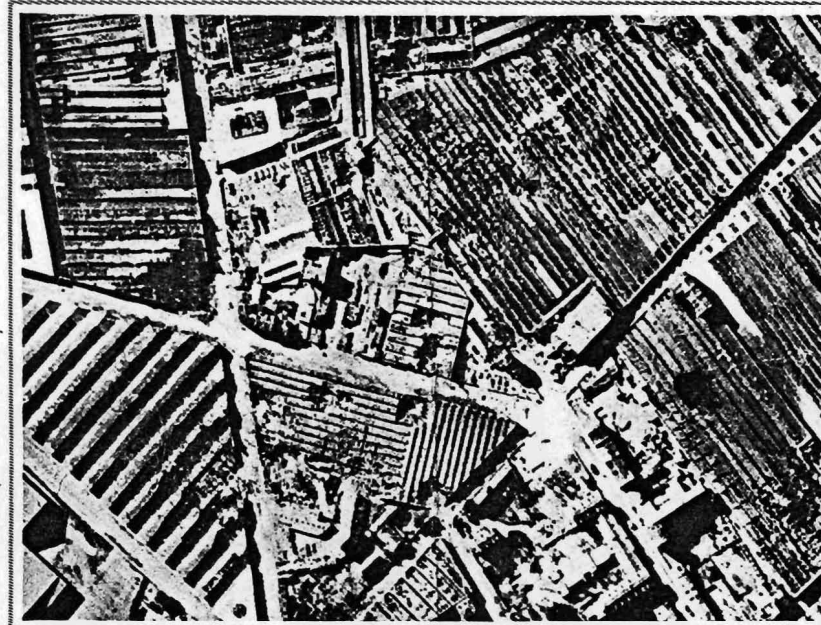

Paris Among Eight Enemy Targets Hit

Forts, Marauders Pound Air Bases; Nazis Lose 29 Fighters in Day

Eighth Air Force Flying Fortresses and Marauders, smashing Luftwaffe airfields and repair bases for the second successive day, blasted eight targets in France yesterday, including the former Caudron-Renault aircraft factory at Paris, now used for Me109 repairs.

The day's raids, which cost the enemy 29 fighters knocked down by the Forts and the supporting fighters, came only a few hours after the same combination of heavy and medium USAAF bombers, striking out over the coast shortly before dusk Thursday under cover of the year's biggest fighter blanket, pounded two airdromes and a power station in western France.

10 Planes Missing

Eight heavy bombers and two fighters failed to return from yesterday's raids, and one medium bomber, one light bomber and two fighters were missing after the Thursday evening operation.

The success of the heavily-armed Fortress against the toughest sort of fighter opposition—23 of yesterday's bag of 29 enemy planes were credited to the B17s—led Air Chief Marshal Sir Philip Joubert to assert in a war commentary broadcast by radio that "It almost looks as though the Fortress type of bomber has defeated the contemporary fighter."

The Forts hit five targets in their early morning strike into France: 1—The Caudron-Renault aircraft factory in Paris, separated by a bend in the Seine from the large Renault motor works heavily damaged by Forts last April 5; 2—A large Luftwaffe repair base for single-engine fighters at Romilly-sur-Seine, 65 miles southeast of Paris; 3—A base for fighter reserves at Beaumont le Roger, on the Risle river, about 30 miles southwest of Rouen; 4—An operational fighter base near St. Andre, almost due west of Paris; 5—Repair and service installations for Me109 single-engine fighters at Meulan les Mureaux, on the Seine, about 25 miles northwest of Paris.
